Minford Students Witness Highway Opening

At 8:30am on December 14, the Portsmouth Bypass, formerly known as the Southern Ohio Veterans Memorial Highway, finally opened to the public after almost 55 years of planning and about 5 years of construction. Over \$630 million was poured into the freeway, and it paid off, as our newspaper staff were some of the first to be on the new bypass, designed to cut travel times down by 15 minutes from Portsmouth to Lucasville.

HISTORY

The project was first conceived in the 1950s and '60s, as the old streets of Portsmouth couldn't accommodate the rapidly growing city, but the project never took off due to a lack of funding (though it did garner lots of attention). It wasn't until the 1990s that the lines were drawn for a new bypass to join Lucasville and Portsmouth, providing a sort of shortcut to replace the travelling up SR 335 and following Lucasville-Minford Road to get to Lucasville, skipping the 23-52 interchange altogether.

LAYOUT

The highway will start with an interchange on US 52 near Portsmouth, going north to meet up with SR 140. The highway will continue northward and meet with SR 335 at the airport/Sunshine Church. The highway will then turn northwest to meet with Lucasville-Minford Road, and eventually go on to meet with US 23 just north of Lucasville.

OPENING

The ribbon cutting ceremony at the airport commenced at 2:30 Thursday afternoon, amid many people awaiting the opening. The ribbon was laid out by a construction worker dressed as Santa Claus, and cut soon after. A parade of antique cars drove down the highway, as the first vehicles to drive down the new highway. Four buses filled with students from Minford, Valley, and Wheelersburg followed after the cars. The vehicles drove to US 23, then turned back and drove the whole way back to US 52, before turning again and exiting at the SR 335 interchange.



WINTER CROSSWORD



